3. Visit our mobile-friendly website, **openhousechicago.org**, to plan your OHC itinerary and to get the most up-to-date info on sites and hours.
4. OHC is organized by the **Chicago Architecture Foundation (CAF)**, a nonprofit cultural organization, in collaboration with numerous community partners and sponsors.
5. CAF members have access to four **exclusive members-only sites** and priority-access at all other sites.
6. Become a member and receive your OHC benefits instantly by visiting **openhousechicago.org/membership**
7. Three sites require reservations. RSVPs have closed for this year. Become a CAF member to get information on next year's sites before OHC.

About the Chicago Architecture Foundation

Five years ago, the Chicago Architecture Foundation (CAF) decided to bring a city-wide festival of architecture and design to Chicago—the quintessential city of American architecture. London originated the “Open House” concept more than 20 years ago, New York City had several years under its belt and even Toronto produced a similar festival. By 2011, it was Chicago’s time and Open House Chicago was born.

CAF was founded in 1966. As a nonprofit organization dedicated to inspiring people to discover why designed matters, CAF has grown over the years to become a hub for learning about and participating in architecture and design. If you visit us at 224 S. Michigan Avenue, you’ll find a flurry of activity: visitors preparing

to embark on a tour, workshops for students, lectures for adults and field trip groups gathered around our 1,000-building scale model of Chicago.

In addition to Open House Chicago, CAF is best known for our 85 different Chicago-area tours, including the top-ranked tour in the city: the Chicago Architecture Foundation River Cruise aboard Chicago’s First Lady Cruises. Our 450 highly-trained volunteer docents lead more than 6,000 walking, boat, bus and L train tours each year. CAF also offers exhibitions, public programs and education activities for all ages.

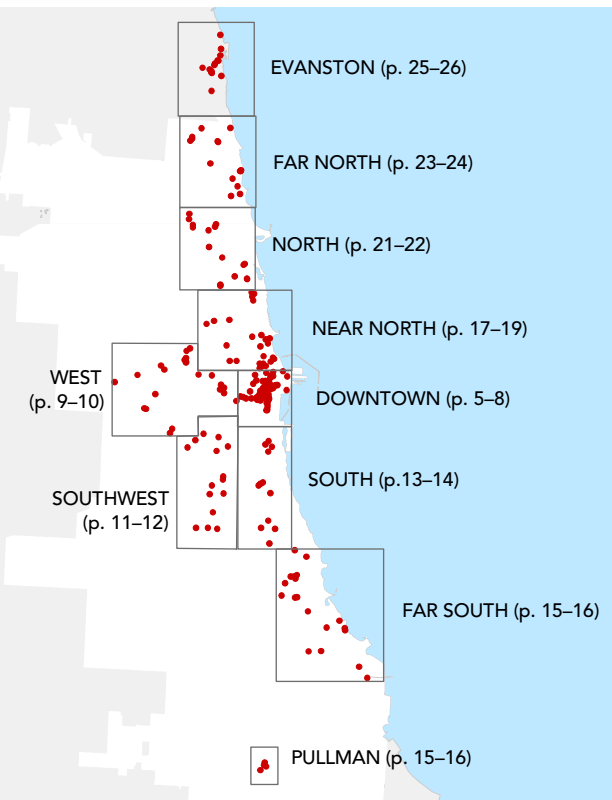

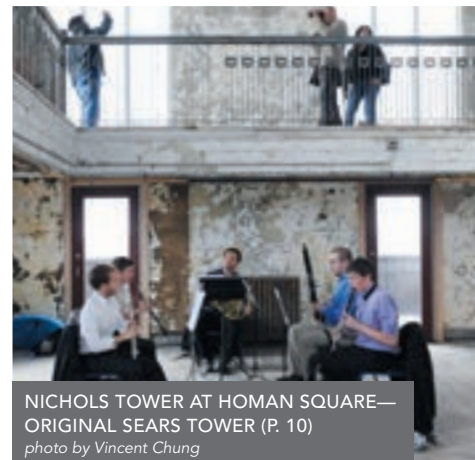

Estimated arrivals are also available by text message. Simply follow the instructions on the bottom of bus stop signs or go to the CTA Bus Tracker website.
